Upcoming Services

Sunday, November 10, 2019

"Pine Ridge Reservation: Destigmatizing American Indians," by Aidan Small.

This presentation will be a discussion of historical political perceptions of Native Americans and the impact of European settlement on the Lakota tribes. The speaker will also talk about his experiences during a week of cultural immersion and service projects on Pine Ridge Reservation, a Lakota reservation that is currently the poorest county in the United States.

Sunday, November 17, 2019

"Through the Looking Glass: Affirming and Living Our Values in a Dominance-Obsessed World," by Jennifer Parker.

This talk highlights the beliefs and attitudes that enable all forms of violence in our culture in spite of religious and humanistic beliefs we say we hold. Jennifer adapted work she's presented in workshops and in a book she's writing that helps to understand the issues behind #MeToo and Black Lives Matter, as well as other social justice movement. She identifies that dominance socialization is infused throughout our social institutions irrespective of ideology. Her talk draws on the work of Riane Eisler, James Baldwin, Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. and spiritual traditions.
