
King John Sigismund, the first Unitarian King



King John Sigismund's Edict (an official order or proclamation issued by a person in authority) of Torda, 1568:

"His majesty reaffirms that in every place the preachers shall preach and explain the gospel each according to his understanding of it, and if the congregation like it, or not, not one shall compel them, for their souls would not be satisfied, but they shall be permitted to keep a preacher whose teaching they approve. Therefore (no one) shall be reviled for his religion by anyone, according to the statutes, and it is not permitted that anyone should threaten anyone else by imprisonment or by removal from his post for his teaching, for faith is the gift of God..."

Background

In 1991

- Transylvania was poor, disrupted, struggling to find new ways forward after collapse of Romania's communist government in 1989
- Like its neighboring villages, Nagyajta escaped the government's scheduled destruction of thousands of rural villages populated by ethnic Hungarians but needed our support

Nagyajta's Partnership Invitation

In 1991 Nagyajta's minister invited a delegation from FUS to come and visit, writing:

"We have a common language, that of LOVE, which may be understood by everybody, and I hope, this language may become our common property. I think you can feel in my words this common language of love."

Nagyajta's Unitarian Church

We shared a religious heritage but found ourselves in a cultural world far older than us

- The church was founded in 1568
- It was built in the 1300s and was Catholic before the Reformation
- Fortress walls were built in 1222 and 1500
- It was restored with EU funding completed in 2022

The Nagyajta-FUS Partnership

- Began in 1992 with a visit by FUS ministers
 Max Gaebler and Ruth Gibson plus 5 members
- I was able to visit in 1994 and found a church with no minister and damaged by earthquakes but members who were eager to work with us
- Early activities included casting a new church bell, reinforcing the bell tower and organizing youth exchanges between our churches

Nagyajta Led our Partnership

- Since Nagyajta had only an elementary school, a scholarship fund was created to support local students needing room and board support at high school and for high school graduates to study at seminary in Kolozsvar
- We attended one scholarship student's investiture as minister in 2010
- Program was expanded to include youth book awards, educational travel, holiday party



(International Association for Religious Freedom) in Cluj, Romania, September 2023

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This was a three-day event with 24 sessions, including 5 by the International Association of Liberal Religious Women, and (150?) attendees from (20?) countries representing two dozen different religious groups.

 The IARF is a charitable organization that works for religious freedom around the world. It was founded in Boston in 1900, and "is the oldest international group that promotes dialogues among religions". The IARF has over 90 affiliated religious groups, spread over 20 countries in the world, with a wide range of faiths represented, including denominations of Hinduism, Buddhism, Jainism, Shinto, Taoism, Christianity, Juudaism, and Islam. In 1972, IARF was granted consultative status with the United Nations Economic and Social Council (ECOSOC). It was the catalyst for the formation of the "Committee on Freedom of Religion or Belief" in 1989, which was granted formal status with ECOSOC in 1992.


who became the only Unitarian monarch in history at the urging of Dávid Ferenc, and in 1568, at a time when much of the rest of Europe was engulfed in religious wars, his Diet passed the Edict of Torda, which prohibited persecution for religious reasons.

Rissho Kosei-kai

"A global Buddhist movement centered on the Lotus Sutra."

It was founded in 1938 by two breakaway members from another Buddhist sect. The first meeting was held in a house and some 30 people joined at that time.

By 1941, membership had reached 1000, and a "Great Sacred Hall" was completed in 1964.

As of 2010, there are over 240 churches and centers in 20 countries. Membership currently stands at 6.5 million members, with the majority living in Japan.
