

Religious Education News In A Nutshell

What are the kids up to?

Pre- School

We made butterflies to celebrate our individuality (Principle #1). We experimented with paints to find the “truth” of paints.

K-1-2

We explored the idea of freedom of choice as Unitarian Universalists. We are free to search for what is right for us as individuals (Principle #4). These ideas were emphasized as we read the story “**Being Unitarian**” by Ruth Gibson. We also had fun talking about humor as a UU treasure.

3-4-5

On April 2, we read “Elephant Child” by Rudyard Kipling. We then talked about some very un-settling activities in this story that violated UU principles: prejudice and stereotyping in particular.

On April 9, we talked a bit about UU principle #2 – all people should be treated fairly. We also began cutting out letters for our ROY G BIV banner.

6-8

Attendance was up this half of the month which made for some lively discussion.

9-12

We delved into matters of conscience and use of the democratic process – UU principles #4 and #5). We also did some merengue dancing in preparation for an upcoming service on the Dominican Republic.
