Join Doleta Chapru and a distinguished panel as they discuss the good things they remember about their past religious beliefs. Can you remember positive things in your spiritual background? Perhaps you'd like to share those memories at this service?

Sunday, September 17

Dr. Bruce Barrett will speak about the need for health care coverage available to all people. He will be showing slides developed by Physicians for a National Health Care System. The central message is that a system founded on universal access would be more cost-effective as well as more equitable. He'll compare our system with the socialized system of Canada.

Dr. Barrett is a family practice physician (MD, PhD) with the University of Wisconsin Medical School (Assistant Professor, Department of Family Medicine). He is the current president of the Madison chapter of Physicians for Social Responsibility. Over half of his time is spent on research, under a grant from the National Center for Complementary and Alternative Medicine at the National Institutes of Health. He has a special interest in medicinal plants and herbal medicines. His background includes a doctorate in Anthropology with work in Nicaragua, Guatemala and Vietnam. He also has strong interests in crosscultural and international medicine.

The Universal Connection - Summer At Camp

Were you bored this past summer? Longing for some Unitarian connection with other youth/adults? Well, I found fulfillment in a fun filled week located in a beautiful region of upstate New York. This summer, I went to a camp called Camp Unirondack in Lowville, New York. Coming from Prairie where the youth group has about five members at a good meeting, it was at first overwhelming being surrounded by over 50 teens, not restricted to, but mostly Unitarians.

When I got there on a Saturday, looking lost and not knowing where to go, during free time, an incredibly friendly group of kids took me into their group, no questions asked. I was only at the camp for a total of three days. (I was backpacking for 5 days in the Adirondacks with five kids and three leaders from the camp for the rest of the time), but those three days were enough for me to want to go back every summer. It was such a warm atmosphere of friendly, unique teens and extremely understanding adults.

Some highlights were two workshops a day, with free time in between to sail, play ultimate frisbee, do arts, crafts, etc. The week I was there they scheduled people from Amnesty International leading morning workshops. Other perks include wish night, (at which every camper gets a wish granted by another camper, no matter how odd; imagination is a key factor), a talent show, a dance, and a lodge sleep over, where the whole camp on the last night can stay up all night.

Over the course of the summer, the camp offers sessions for all different ages, including a family camp at the end of the summer. I will definitely be returning next summer, and I have only the best to say about the strong friendships and great times that I had while I was there.
