

The Book Club selection for March is They Marched into Sunlight by David Maraniss.

608 pages, suggested by Phyllis Long. "Here is the epic story of Vietnam and the sixties told through the events of a few gripping, passionate days of war and peace in October 1967.... [This book] brings that tumultuous time back to life while exploring questions about the meaning of dissent and the official manipulation of truth, issues as relevant today as they were decades ago." (Goodreads review) This is a Soup Sunday, so we will eat first and then retire to the Annex for our meeting at about 12:15.

I think that we make a mistake by ignoring Easter or by celebrating it only as the beginning of spring. There is much in this holy day that can be of use to us in our daily lives. MUSINGS FROM THE MINISTER—Sandra Ingham

Samuel Willenberg died on Friday, February 19. You probably don't recognize that name. In the early 1990's, I read a mesmerizing book by Willenberg titled "Surviving Treblinka". Samuel Willenberg, age 93, was the last survivor of the Treblinka concentration camp. But he didn't just survive there until the camp was liberated. He was part of a revolt, on August 2, 1943, when several hundred prisoners stole weapons, set fire to the camp and fled into the woods. Most of those who revolted were either killed by the Nazis or captured by villagers and returned to the camp. Willenberg got away, even though he was shot in the leg, as did 66 others.

I wanted to write to Willenberg, and to the authors of similar books (I remember one about the Sobibor death camp.), partly because everything I had learned about the Holocaust up until these books came out was that no one resisted in the camps and partly out of sheer admiration for what these people did in their attempts to escape. Of course, I never wrote to any of them. What would I have said? Oh, so very sorry that you had to endure the concentration camp experience? So sorry about humanity's huge failure in this time period? I have similar thoughts and feelings about Syria and humanity's failure again, here in the

21st century.

There are about 180,000 concentration camp survivors in Israel and about the same number worldwide. More than 1,000 die each month. Within seven years, most of those still living probably will not be well enough to share their memories. This fact makes me immensely sad. I have read a lot about the Holocaust. I have taken graduate-level classes on the subject. Yet, the more I learn, the more baffled I am about how this could have happened. I wonder how I would have responded to the dehumanizing of others, especially if I felt threatened or feared that my loved ones were in danger. For me, the "defining moment" of the twentieth century, the defining moment of my becoming an adult, has been the Holocaust.

I struggle to remember that there are many faith traditions, grassroots movements, social justice organizations, human right groups, just plain brave people out there in the wider world working to counter those who would have us treat anyone as lesser than or as "Other;" people working to preserve memory; people working to re-define and re-image what it means to be human. There is a lot to do. Prairie helps me "keep on keeping on".... May it do the same for you... Rev. Sandy

Message from the President—Gary Gates

On Sunday, February 14th, I offered two different ways of looking at our responsibilities under the preamble to to the Seven Principles of Unitarian-Universalism.

Afterward, I received an email from a member who had missed that service but had listened to it on Prairie's audio recordings and pod cast web pages. Frankly, this email expressed my viewpoint far better than I did, so for this month's President's column I have decided to share excerpts from it.

"...your words really touched on something that has been niggling at me for some time.

"I came from a UU church where the congregation, and in particular the minister, were FIERCE proponents of gay rights. They were working tirelessly for equality and education and community presence in this area - and though it wasn't the issue that creates "a fire in my belly" for me in particular, I appreciated the fact that my church stood for something - that it was putting words into actions, that it was living out the UU principles in such a concrete and measurable way.

"One of the...servicesat Prairiewas about how to engage new generations of people, people who found themselves disheartened by the challenges before us, people who didn't even know that UU communities existed (much as I hadn't for many years). At that service someone stood up (I think it was Orange) and said that we didn't have a defining issue. She made an offhand comment that has since resonated with me frequently - that environmentalism is the civil rights issue of our time... Wow. Hpw true is that? We are poisoning and killing and exploiting our planet and leaving the price to be paid by people who aren't even born yet......

"We have so many environmentalists at Prairie. I've long thought that it is the one issue that we can all unite on - and it is so desperately needed......"

While I share this writer's enthusiasm for environmental causes, we need to explore other options as well before deciding which issue puts "a fire in our bellies." Even more important, we need to decide if there is any issue we especially want to be known for.

It was not clear to me from the feedback on the 14th that the majority of the congregation wants a change.

In an initiative brought to the Board by members of the congregation, Prairie has initiated a 3- month trial of sharing the weekly offertory collection with a charity identified by the Social Action Committee. Collections taken in February which were shared with the Odyssey Project were robust. Two collections from February will be shared with Justified Anger and in March, all 3 collections will be shared with Yahara House. A fourth charity will be identified for sharing for the month of April. It was determined that sharing collections from an entire month was a more effective way to proceed than two week collections as originally proposed. The experiment will be reviewed by the Board and congregation in May.
