#### **Memorial Service for Orie Loucks**

You are invited to the Memorial Service for Orie Loucks at the Atrium, First Unitarian Society, 10:30 a.m. on Saturday, October 29. Join family and friends to honor and celebrate the life of one of Prairie's "heroes."

Orie Loucks was a founding member of Prairie and a frequent Sunday morning lay minister during his years in Madison, while professor of ecology at the UW. We remember his services on the ethics of ecology and the walks he led in prairies and woods following the services, along with camping trips and hikes at Prairie retreats at Upham Woods. Prairie's emphasis on the Seventh UU Principle, before it was a UU principle, is in major part due to Orie's commitment and leadership.

Orie was the major force behind the UUA Green Congregation initiative, working with his Oxford, Ohio, congregation and other congregations including Prairie, to present this resolution at the UUA General Assembly.
