MUSINGS FROM THE MINISTER

"Are you saying that everyone who voted for Trump is a racist?" I have been asked this question more than once since the election. My answer: "No, many who voted for him are misogynists and many are both racist and misogynist." Please continue reading as I attempt to explain what I mean. *Everyone* is an "...-ist" of some kind. While I might score okay on a test that measured how racist or misogynist I am, I have my own "...-ist" problems—intellectual elitist comes to mind. We all wrestle with prejudices, stereotypes, biases.

I have heard all the excuses for why someone might have voted for Trump. I think that I understand some of the reasons why many people have feelings of frustration and anger towards government and why many people feel abandoned by government and misunderstood and isolated in the so-called land of prosperity. I know that we have failed many people, failed to address very real economic concerns. But I do not agree that problems will be solved by a demagogue, which is what Mr. Trump is.

There is no excuse for voting for a bully who spews hatred, promotes it, legitimizes it. There is never a reason to vote for a demagogue. I don't believe that there will be or can be reconciliation in this country unless and until there is a genuine acknowledgement by Mr. Trump that he made a monumental, colossal mistake with his hateful, divisive words. He must recant; he must apologize to this country. The rest of us need to admit that the bot-

tom line is: we citizens of the United States have voted for hate, intolerance, meanness, exclusivity. We have now sanctioned a whites-only country, given the go-ahead to the dark side of human nature. We are *all* responsible for letting this happen.

How do people of good will respond to this? What do we do now, besides grieve? What can we do to push back against oppression, now that it is the official position of our "leaders"?

I am not sure, but I do know that I can't do *nothing*. I cannot be quiet and passively wait out the next four years. Some thoughts...we redouble, quadruple our social action work, go to meetings, give money, protest, go to rallies and demonstrations, wear safety pins or rainbows or whatever, work harder in the trenches. We have discussion groups here at Prairie, to vent as needed, but, more importantly, to plan *actions* to take to show solidarity in love, not hate. We practice dialoging, really listening, especially to people who don't think like we do. We combat tribalism however we can. Tribalism doesn't work anymore. We are all in the same tribe. To think otherwise is narrow, outdated, dangerous thinking.

The bottom line in this whole mess is that we have given free rein to hate. If we can admit that, then—and only then—we might be able to begin to find common ground and to work on the next layer of very real problems that challenge this country. One ray of hope for me is to remember that there are many, many people "out there" who believe, as I do, in the necessity of living in a multicultural world, people who know in their very bones that we are all connected and that we will not survive on this planet if we ignore that fact.

I don't think that I will be wishing anyone a joyous holiday season this year. That sounds so phony and superficial to me right now. I wish for us all a meditative, soul-searching season of reflection on hate versus love. Which one is really more powerful?—Rev. Sandy


Sunday, December 11th – Old Befana Holiday Musical – We are in for a special treat with this!
