More on Wisconsin Unitarian Universalist State Action Network (WUUSAN)

At the Prairie Annual Meeting on May 20, we will vote whether to join WUUSAN (yes, it's bad but no worse than MUUSJA, pronounced Moosejaw, in Minnesota). It can be changed.

“When you are out there fixing the world, it’s good to have help.” (Donald Skinner, UUWorld 1/3/11).

Wisconsin has an organizing group that has been meeting for close to two years and has had active involvement by representatives from congregations around the state. Molly Plunkett and Rev. Sandy have attended organizing meetings for Prairie, as have representatives from the other Madison UU congregations. Twenty other states have organized social action networks, including Minnesota, Iowa and Michigan. The groups are made up of volunteers from member congregations within the state. They identify critical social justice needs within their state and coordinate action to advance an agenda—could be through legislative change or fundraising. The goal is to get UU voices heard in the public arena.

Mission Statement:

The Wisconsin Unitarian Universalist State Action Network aims to build a statewide advocacy network employing the power of the collective voices of Unitarian Universalists in Wisconsin. We uphold the worth and dignity of *all* while acting to further justice, equity,

and compassion

Vision Statement:

By 2022 WUUSAN will be a strong network of UUs and allies with a track record of:

- Examining social justice issues;
- Collaborating to influence public policy, and
- Bringing about systemic change for those with our reach who need social justice.

What the work of the state action network might look like:

1. Be based on UU principles, especially those that honor the dignity and wellbeing of all.
2. Organize members and friends of our congregations to speak with a collective voice, develop relationships with public officials and legislators to work with them on the state budget and legislation.
3. Develop strong relationships among ourselves, understanding that process is often as important as outcomes.
4. Provide/access training for leadership development and for advocacy.
5. Plan to educate and advocate on certain issues, but be flexible enough to address issues that arise quickly.
6. Mobilize a critical mass and/or key people to help in different geographical areas.

The Wisconsin group will elect a Board of Directors which will meet on a regular basis. Every year there will be an Annual Meeting where all member congregations and member individuals can attend and vote on issues. There will be membership dues for member congregations to fund a part-time Communications/Administrative position though grant writing will also be pursued. Fees will be kept as low as possible as the goal is to involve as many of the 32 Wisconsin UU congregations as possible. Being an active member of a statewide organization increases Prairie visibility.

We think that active membership in a network can help attract new congregants who see the work being done by this UU organization.

Copies of bylaws are available on request to Molly Plunkett and will be available at the annual meeting.

Moving Forward with Remodeling!

Our community has been tremendously generous in pledging toward remodeling our main building house, making it clear that we have the money and the will to move ahead! Your remodeling planning group is meeting with our architect, Todd Barnett, to create more detailed plans and a timeline. We expect it will take several months to hammer out the specifics and get a builder on board. Since there will be major changes to the main floor, Todd indicated that during construction we will be unable to use the upper level for at least three months, depending on our final plans. Changes downstairs will take less time, but will likely make that area unusable for at least a month. At the Spring Parish Meeting

5/20/18, we will ask you to decide on the timing of the remodeling. Should we start as soon as possible, presumably late this fall, and rent space elsewhere to meet during that time? Or should we wait and remodel in the late spring and summer 2019 when our attendance is lower and we can use the Annex and outside space? We are eager to get started, but it's a big project, and the construction will disrupt our programming. Please come to the meeting and let us know how you would like us to proceed.
