Financial Update

Finance Committee

Prairie is currently in good financial condition. We now have five certificates of deposit with varied maturity dates. Total bank deposits (savings, checking, money market, CD's) as of 7/31/23 was \$224,095.

We are in the process of developing the 2024 budget. Committees have submitted their budget requests. The finance chair and treasurer will develop a budget and submit it to the board for initial approval in September.


The 2024 pledge drive will begin in September. We want you to know that 26% of 2023 pledges are from three pledgers (\$37,500 of \$144,500). On behalf of the Prairie community, we want to say we are tremendously grateful for these pledges, and for all pledges. We need to acknowledge that we can't rely on the very high pledges from a few pledgers long term. It's important to gain support from all pledgers to share the load. The finance committee asks that you consider whether you can increase your own pledge.

Social Action Update

Prairie continues to be active in Moses and Allied Partners and Allied Wellness Center and WUUSAN.

Food Support. Once a month, a fairly constant group from Prairie, with support from folks from James Reeb congregation, makes hearty lunches on a Saturday at the River Food Pantry. The food is for distribution in east side neighborhoods and parks.

MOSES continues to be active in many areas. A current report will be in our next issue. In the meantime, look for copies of the MOSES newsletter in Prairie's welcoming area.

Allied Partners, which is a group of churches supporting the Allied neighborhood, has become more active with Allied Dunn's Marsh Neighborhood Ass. (ADMNA). The Association is trying to revitalize after Covid. Allied Partner churches also donate funds that area social workers can use to help residents facing eviction, help with utility bills or for special projects/events in the neighborhood such as monthly community meals sponsored by the ADMNA.

Members of Prairie planted flowers in front of the Dane County social worker office of Joining Forces for Families. Allied Partners has financially supported Allied Fresh which is a project that brings boxes of fresh produce and meat to the Boys and Girls Club and to Chalet Gardens every Friday. 75 households pick up food boxes with food contributed by 2nd Harvest and packaged by volunteers at Badger Prairie Health Care Facility. During Covid Allied Fresh delivered food to more than 200 households in the Allied Drive area. Several Prairie members helped with those deliveries. Allied Fresh needs volunteers and donations to continue its food pipeline. Contact Janice Ferguson at jmfergot3403[at]gmail.com if you have time or money or both.

Allied Wellness Center (AWC) has moved its office and currently rents space from Prairie. The Center has a Spanish speaking Manager and is now able to better serve the large Latine population in the area. On staff are several Community Health Workers, who have been trained through financial and organization support of the Center, and who are currently working support some neighbors who are dealing with trauma issues from gunfire in the area. AWC has sponsored debriefing sessions post violent episodes and sessions around prevention of violence and other training.



WUUSAN is a state wide UU organization for collaboration and coordination around social action. They have been active with UU the Vote and are gearing up to mobilize voters in 2024 in Wisconsin. Prairie is represented on their Board.

Dane Sanctuary Coalition. Among other initiatives the Coalition is providing transportation for undocumented immigrants to IMS hearings in Chicago, Milwaukee and Waukegan II. There are 60 people who registered to drive and have attended a training but only 30 people actually drive with any regularity. In one year the Coalition has arranged for 172 round trips, some include families or more than one member of a family, to a hearing. Prairie Folks Take the Prize for Participation

In two joint meetings of area UU churches, according to my count, Prairie took the prize for participation in attending events away from their home grounds.

On July 23, the traditional trek out to the Free Congregation of Sauk County saw at least 27 people associated with Prairie showing up, including some of our newer members and two online. This was half of all the people in attendance! Afterward, all who came in person shared a truly outstanding potluck and a lot of visiting.

Then on August 13, all three Madison UU congregations – First Unitarian Society of Madison (FUS), the James Reeb Congregation (Reeb), and Prairie – gathered in a joint meet-up at the Vilas Park shelter. At least 32 Prairie-ites made up the congregation of probably over 100 people.

Not only did Prairie show up, Prairie members participated materially to the services. At Sauk City, Prairie's President Kathy Converse and member Mary Mullen gave short talks on the topic of "Gratitude."

At Vilas Park, several things stood out for me. When the minister from FUS credited only FUS and the UUA for launching the James Reeb Congregation, someone from Prairie shouted out, "Prairie, too." Well I remember that several of our members volunteered to help give Reeb its start. Prairie had passed a resolution at the April 27,1986, Parish meeting to "empower the Board to cooperate with First Society and the Central Midwest District in discussing the establishment of a third society." The helping Prairie folks never returned to us, but that's the way such things go. Reeb's minister noted that it is now 30 years old.

Again, during this joint service, Kathy Converse represented Prairie, this time speaking on "The Stories of Us." At the end, when she displayed a copy of one volume of the Prairie history set, an audible sound of surprise and awe rose from the gathering. The brown-covered book, obviously a tome of weight, clearly surprised and impressed folks from FUS and Reeb.

Prairie members also contributed to the music. Ron Frye led singing with his guitar, and John Wunderlin wowed everyone with two numbers on his Alphorn. Too bad it started sprinkling and we had to miss two chances to sing as gathered congregations.
