

# **Programming Needs Your Talents**

Want to help with our Sunday morning program but you aren't a "committee type" of person?

Want to help plan programs but can't always commit to being there on Sunday morning?

Don't let that stop you from joining the Program Committee! The Program Committee is redefining roles so that more people can be involved with our Sunday program, and folks with different interests can find their niche.

- 1. Program Committee Members are the main program planners. They set the overall structure of our Sunday services and take turns serving as the coordinator for individual programs. Coordinators communicate with presenters, identify presiders, choose readings and readers, and work with the music team to find appropriate songs and other music for the services. They make sure programs are announced in our newsletters.
- Program Assistants assure that things go smoothly at the Sunday service. They
  make sure orders of service and hymnals are distributed, get microphones to folks
  who need them, adjust lights if needed, and recruit people who will pass the
  offering baskets.
- 3. <u>Music team members</u> assure that we have accompanists for all our songs, schedule preludes and offertory music including choir performances, and help program coordinators choose songs appropriate for each presentation.



# **Program Committee, cont.**

1. Program Committee Chair organizes the program teams and is responsible for recruiting members. The chair sets the agenda and gets committee meetings scheduled, makes sure there are program coordinators and assistants for each service, makes annual budget requests, and partners with the committee to report to the congregation at the spring and fall parish meetings. The chair assures that committee policies and procedures are up to date. The chair writes newsletter articles to keep the congregation informed and surveys the congregation periodically about its wishes for our programs.

Each of these roles is satisfying and rewarding in its own way. All are essential to our Sunday services. The Nominating Committee is working with the Program Committee to identify Prairie folks who would like to serve in these roles. We need many of you to contribute your ideas, time, and talents! # MidAmerica and General Assemblies Delegates and Voting

The Board of Directors had a draft policy about selecting delegates to MidAmerica Regional Assembly and General Assembly. The board reviewed the policy and added information about voting during their meeting on March 19. The policy will be added to the current Policy & Procedure Manual on the members page of the website.

## **Delegates**

- The Board selects delegates prioritizing those in or entering leadership positions.
- Email our Administrator by April 10 if you would like to be a delegate at MidAmerica Regional Assembly (April 19-20) either virtually or in-person and by May 20 to be a delegate at virtual General Assembly (June 20-23).
- It is FREE for Delegates to attend all the business sessions this year at General Assembly.
- Prairie has money in our budget for attending the MidAmerica and General Assemblies. Email our Administrator to request funds.
- MidAmerica in person workshops will not be streamed for virtual participants but they will have on demand/virtual options for those attendees. General Assembly is fully virtual.

## **Voting for General Assembly**

- All members will receive a short survey (both electronic and paper formats will be available) for how they want to vote. This will be as anonymous as possible with our Administrator checking only membership status and tallying the numbers.
- Our three delegates will vote proportionally based on members' voting (i.e. if close to 66% of members voted yes on the first proposed amendment, then two delegates would vote yes and one would vote no).

# "So When Did You Know?"



Interweave Invites You to a Book Discussion, Sunday, April 21. You don't even have to buy the book!

She/Her. He/Him. They/Theirs.

We've all heard Prairie people mention these pronouns in referring to themselves, but most of us have probably stumbled over using the pronouns *they* and *their* when referring to our transgender members and friends. It's hard to break old habits, but why even try?

Prairie's Interweave group (LGBTQ folks and allies) is offering a chance to deepen our understanding of this



issue by leading a facilitated discussion of the Prologue and Chapter 1 of the fascinating and often humorous book *None of the Above* by Travis Alabanza. Travis Alabanza is a racialized, young, queer person living in England. The selection is only 32 pages long and will be attached to an upcoming email.

The book as a whole is a series of seven essays based on seven phrases that have been directed at them for being transgender. The phrase for Chapter 1 is, "So when did you know?" Chapter 2's phrase is, "But I mean, *real* trans."

A blurb from the publisher's website notes, "These phrases act as a lens through which they explore attitudes and misconceptions about gender, illuminating broader issues within a culture that insists on gender as a fixed identity. *None of the Above* explicates how these rigid ideas of gender are enforced by people—on others, but also on themselves."

Give the Prologue and Chapter 1 a try. Then join us for a discussion after the Sunday service on April 21 from 11:30 am to 1 pm in the Annex. All are welcome. We are planning to have childcare during the meeting.

"So when did you know?"



Childhood is always an interesting topic to raise if you want to get to know someone. Often a telltale sign of a relationship deepening is learning about your partner's embarrassing school story or when they first broke the law. I can tell I am maybe entering the terrifying process

# A Letter from MOSES

Every year MOSES sends a letter detailing accomplishments from the past year and thanking us for our participation. Here is their recap for 2023.



Dear MOSES Congregational/Organizational member,

Thank you for your continued support for MOSES! 2023 was another strong year. Below are some key highlights that your contributions helped us to accomplish:

- MOSES celebrated a new county jail agreement in April. The Board of Supervisors' Black Caucus, supported by MOSES, had successfully argued for a five-floor jail and an array of criminal legal reforms, but that plan was vetoed by the County Executive in favor of a six-floor proposal. The Black Caucus announced their support for the six-floor proposal in exchange for Sheriff Barrett agreeing to support many of these reforms, which would reduce the jail population and create a more humane criminal legal system.
- In March, the MOSES Religious Leaders Caucus hosted "A Time to Forgive," a
  wonderful conference at Door Creek Church featuring keynote speaker Dr. Robert
  Enright. We believe that forgiveness is a key to reforming the criminal legal system
  as detailed in Dr. Enright's book 8 Keys to Forgiveness. MOSES offered this gift to
  the community for free.
- MOSES took on dyslexia as part of its scrutiny of the school-to-prison pipeline. Up to 20% of school-age kids are dyslexic, and often there is no systematic screening for dyslexia. The ultimate results can be, and often are, functionally illiterate adults. According to the Correctional Education Association, 75% of the people confined in the carceral system are functionally illiterate. To improve literacy teaching for all students, including those with dyslexia, MOSES successfully joined literacy advocates to support adoption of Act 20 to require schools statewide to use the Science of Reading, which is key to effective literacy education.

# A Letter from MOSES, cont.

- MOSES also supported and collaborated with statewide efforts to address
  Wisconsin's tenant eviction records retention policy. Eviction history has been
  cited as the most significant factor contributing to homelessness. Legal
  Action of Wisconsin (LAW) filed a petition with the Wisconsin Supreme Court
  to eliminate or greatly reduce Wisconsin's 20-year eviction records retention
  policy. Following hearings at which MOSES testified, the Court voted 4-3 to
  shorten access to most state eviction records from 20 years to two years.
- MOSES hired a new Community Organizer, James Morgan, in June. James educated himself while in prison, helped found MOSES upon his release, worked for JustDane for several years as a Peer Support Specialist, and attended and later worked for the Odyssey Project. As a result, James is well-equipped with the background and experience to support and lead MOSES's efforts to address our numerous social and prison reform justice issues. In addition, James is passionate about the world he wants to see and the efforts needed to achieve that vision. We are very pleased to have James with us as Organizer!
- We wrapped up the year with our annual Transformation Celebration gala, where we celebrated the success stories of three formerly incarcerated people who are now successful members of our community. This is a tradition MOSES values highly and we welcome your participation in the coming years.

With your continued support, we are optimistic about the new year and the opportunities it will offer. The ongoing commitment of our member congregations and organizations to that work is deeply appreciated!
