

UNITARIAN-UNIVERSALIST

Leader: Barbara Heine Here is an opportunity to experience the new UUA curriculum unit for adults.

FOCUS ON NOAH

Leader: Margaret Odell

This is an RE teacher training workshop, for upper elementary grades, in the use of the new curriculum unit on the Old Testament.

YOUR STORY, MY STORY

Leader: Emil Gudmundson

This session will be devoted to the development of your personal theology and/or philosophy: exploring the basic questions of life.

INSTITUTIONAL REGENERATION IN A U U SOCIETY

Leader: Max Goodson

The goal here is to clarify thoughts and feelings that people experience in a society; clarifying needs and sharing goals; planning and carrying out activities; spontaneous celebration as a measure of success.

THE INDIVIDUAL, THE CHURCH AND ALCOHOL

Leader: Allan Senty

Is the church a "pusher" of alcoholism, or is the individual pushing alcohol into the church? This group will explore acitivities in church life, church community, and the social problem of alcoholism.

LAY MINISTRY

Leader: Charles Davidson

The Madison Prairie Society's unique rotating system of lay ministers will be examined with a detailed look at how the lay ministers coordinate programs in three month terms.

ADULT SEXUALITY WORKSHOPS Leader: John Zahn

This discussion will be based on the experiences of an adult discussion group at the Madison church.

FORMAT FOR SHARING: EXTENDED FAMILIES

Leader: John Mitchell

An alternative to "going it alone" will be presented here based upon a continuing experience.

THE VOLUNTEER

Leader: Jane Clay

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What's happening to the volunteer movement? How does the church fit in? What matters to each of us with regard to the way we spend our time? What are the ethical concepts involved? This questions will form the discussion base.

CRIMINAL JUSTICE

Leader: An attorney from the Unitarian-Universalist Service Committee

A lively discussion promises to follow the documentary film *3,000 Years and Life* which gives you a fascinating look at self-government during a guard strike in a prison.

AFFECTING THE SYSTEM: UU's IN POLITICS

Leader: Naila Harper

This time will be devoted to a close look at the individual's role in public policy. There will be a dialog with UU's who are serving in elected offices.

INTERGEN

Leader: LRY

This is an intergenerational workshop with the goal of adult/youth interaction and communication.

R.E. WORKSHOP

Leader: Margaret E. Williams

A look at how we build awareness of discriminatory attitudes, value differences and differences in life style. For both students and teachers.

BRAINSTORMING DISTRICT PROBLEMS AND PROGRAM POSSIBILITIES

Leader: Derek Staats

Keynote Speaker: Margaret E. Williams is a consultant in the UUA Department of Education and Social Concerns. She works with churches in the areas of leadership training, goal setting and developing awareness of social issues.
