FROM CAPITAL COMMUNITY CITIZENS NEWSLETTER, MARCH-APRIL 1977

"Prairie Unitarian Universalist Society presented us with a most luxuriant living orchid plant at their Sunday service, March 27th, as the group that 'has done more than any other in the community' to protect, enhance, and preserve our environment. Patricia Watkins, lay minister, presented the plant to Janet Herzog....Following the awards ceremony, Steve Derene gave a retrospective look at 10 years of 0 & 0 awards. The church members then divided into discussion groups to nominate their own 'Roses' and "Rhubarbs' (later amended to 'Rutabagas'). Their most repested nominations for 'Roses' went to the Alternate Parade of Homes while MATC drew the largest share of 'Rutabagas'. We sincerely thank the Prairie Unitarians for their recognition of our group's service to the community."

We invited a friend to come to Hugh Iltis's talk on Sunday, but when she heard there would be slides she said, No, she never went to slide shows. We are sorry about others who might have been deterred from coming (there was a good crowd, though) by the reference in the announcement to "pretty pictures." (Though Hugh is maybe a little hard on babies, we have to admit it's a consistent position.) His deep concern for the fate of this world he was showing us (an area of Peru) under the attack of people trying to "improve" it was made far more immediate by the pictures.

His message is nicely summed up in his opening remarks about Emily Dickinson and prairies: (could she have imagined how those lines might appear in 1977?) To make a prairie/ It takes a clover and one bee/ and revery./ The revery alone will do/ If bees are few. "The hell it will," said Hugh.
