# SUMMARY FROM SEPTEMBER 28 BOARD MEETING

Prairie UU monthly board meeting was held on September 28 at Drapkin's. George Caldén reported that the membership committee suggests an article in the paper on all new lay ministers. New members should receive UU WORLD as well as PRAIRIE FIRE. Three orientation meetings will be held each year. Two greeters will be on hand each Sunday morning to help new people feel welcome. Paper stickers will be provided for new people while others will continue to use the plastic name holders.

It was moved and seconded that when "under taking to receive monies for subsequent disbursements for a segregated purpose, from individuals and/or groups unconnected with Prairie Society, the Social Action Committee must first get Board approval."

Chambliss said the work day went well. A thermostat is being looked into. Czoschke is donating an electric broom until an efficient, light vacuum cleaner is purchased.

Ostler reported that 10% of 1982 pledges are not coming in. The committee is authorized to increase the Capital Improvement Fund to \$2000.
