TURNING POINTS SERVICE SET FOR NOV. 1 For most of us, personal growth and change can set our lives in new directions. Traditionally, services on Nov. 1st--All Saints' Day--honor the memories and achievements of those close to the group who have died in the past year. However, Prairie Society belongs to the living tradition. Our current series of services about changes and choices in the lives of children and youth reinforce the realization, especially in current times, that learning and making transitions are a lifelong endeavor. Come and share your experiences with a panel of Prairie members who will be telling us of meaningful changes they have made in their lives.

FUNDRAISING DRIVE GATHERS STEAM

The drive for pledges to finance the \$85,000 remodeling project approved at the recent parish meeting already is gathering steam—and it isn't yet officially underway! The Fundraising Committee reports that through Sunday, Oct. 18, members have already pledged \$10,560 toward our goal of a down-payment of at least \$25,000. By Sunday, Nov. 8th we hope to contact all Madison—area members in person to seek their pledges.

To help keep the ball rolling, an All-Parish Fundraising "Blitz" is scheduled for the afternoon and evening of Nov. 8th. On that day you can expect a member of the Fundraising Committee to visit you in your home (if s/he hasn't already done so) to solicit your pledge for the remodeling fund. Canvassers will meet at Prairie at noon Nov. 8 for a potluck lunch to kick off the fund drive.

Call for Agenda Items For Nov. 22 Parish Meeting

Items of business for the fall parish meeting should be submitted NOW! Submit them before Nov. 1st to President Mary Mullen or Vice-President Pat Watkins,

preferably in writing.

This is the easy way to arrange for Prairie to discuss concerns you feel we should be dealing with. New business items not submitted prior to the Nov. 1 deadline may be raised at the parish meeting ONLY at the request of 10 members. However, by-law changes can be considered only if the written agenda carries a full statement of the proposed amendment. The main business of the fall parish meeting is adoption of the 1988 operating budget. Committees also will report their activities.

"Prime the Pump" With Your G.A. Resolutions

Prairie is entitled to submit one social justice resolution to the UUA Commission on General Resolutions. The Commission chooses up to 10 resolutions for all parishes to consider in the Parish Poll. The 3 "winners" are placed on the 1988 General Assembly Agenda. Individuals are now invited to submit resolutions for Prairie to consider.
