## Potluck Picnic and Sports Day

The Sunday "service" for Prairie Society on June 26th was a Potluck Picnic, hiking and outdoor sports day at Brigham County Park just North of Blue Mounds. Prairie's table area was graced with a spectacular view north toward the Wisconsin River and a delightful cooling breeze. The burning ban precluded any sort of charcoal grilling at the park, but that did not daunt the culinary creativity of the 16 or so Prairie folk who eventually showed up for the event. Many of us enjoyed a pleasant nature walk in the wooded area of the park after the potluck meal was over.

## **Remodeling Bids Opened**

Once again bids were received and opened, this time for the reduced plan that was developed when the bids for the original project were so far over the estimates (and our ability to pay). The lowest bidder bid \$70,620 for the basic job plus \$3,923 for the first alternate (a second bathroom in the basement), \$4,200 for the second alternate (a handicapped entrance directly into the basement), and \$1,560 for the third alternate (a handicapped entrance into the office area at the rear of the building). The total of these prices is \$80,363, which, together with the landscaping costs and the balance due the architect comes to about \$92,000 - the sum authorized by the spring parish meeting.

At its regular meeting on June 27, the Prairie Board approved the low bidder's proposals including all three alternates. The approval is contingent upon acceptance of the bidder's qualifications and upon the successful negotiation of a mortgage loan for \$66,000. The contractor estimates that he will need seven weeks to finish the job once he begins, which should have everything ready for us to reoccupy the building by Labor Day. Keep your fingers crossed!
