Fundamental Changes Series

Sunday services during the term of Jack Jallings lay ministry, from March 12 through May 7, will have the central theme of "Fundamental Change". To quote Jack exactly, "When one looks at society, at home and world wide - economic, political, environmental, educational, and many other concerns - only one answer is clear - namely that fundamental changes are necessary." The lay ministry will feature seven or eight individuals, representing both conventional and unconventional approaches, describing what they believe those changes should be. Controversial? Yes. Chaotic? Probably. Disagreements? Without a doubt!

Norma Briggs, a long time member of Prairie, an attorney, will begin the "Fundamental Changes" series with a presentation on the subject of Children's Rights vs Parent's Rights.

Prairie Ski Outing

Re-Scheduled

The second annual cross-country ski outing originally scheduled for March 4th at Dave and Marcia Johnson's farm near Coloma had to be **rescheduled due to the ice storm** on March 3rd. The outing will now be held on **Saturday, March 11th**. Skiing will begin at 9:30 AM and continue until everyone's too tired to go on... Dave and Marcia will provide a pot of hot chili and skiers are asked to bring a dish to pass for a Potluck Dinner.

To get to the Johnson's farm, take Hwy. 51 North to Coloma and exit at

the Hwy. 21 off ramp (about 75 miles). Go East on Hwy. 21 about 4 blocks to the Coloma cemetery. Turn right on Slater Street and go about 1 1/2 miles South to the "Lumber" sign on the left and the mailbox on the right. Turn right into the driveway to the house.

This is a Fundraising Event. The requested donation is \$5 per adult and \$3 per child. The event is subject to cancellation due to unfavorable snow conditions. If there is any question as to cancellation, call Prairie at 608 / 271-8218 for a last minute report.

Board Approves Sunrise School

Informational Meeting Set

After a long meeting devoted to estimating the costs of renting space to the Sunrise School, the Prairie Board, on Feb. 12th, gave tentative approval to the rental proposal. The first step in the process will be to apply to the City of Madison for conditional use permits that will allow Sunrise to occupy our building and to use the Knights of Columbus parking lot located a block north of Prairie for teacher parking. Vice President Jack Jallings filed requests for these permits February 27, which means that the Madison Plan Commission will hold a public hearing on them on March 20.

Meantime, a neighborhood informational meeting was held on March 1. The neighborhood meeting, attended by 10 residents (90 flyers had been distributed) turned up concerns about parking and traffic primarily. These concerns were allayed somewhat by Sunrise's agreement to rent teacher parking space from the Knights of Columbus and to inform parents to park only adjacent to Prairie property and not in front of homes. Sunrise predicts that no more than six cars at a time will be dropping or picking up children, which means our parking space on the street should be quite adequate initially.

The Board tentatively set the rent at \$10,800 annually (with a provision to return part of that if costs are substantially less than estimated). The Board also specified that details of space use must be negotiated to Prairie's satisfaction before any rental decision is final.

Uppermost in the minds of the Board is our own need to have a place that will remain welcoming to our members and friends and their children and full protection from cash subsidization of Sunrise School. The cost estimates include line items for reserve, a share of the mortgage, and contingencies. Together, these "cushions" amount to over 30% of the \$10,800 tentative rental fee. In arriving at the tentative rental fee, the Board estimated that our janitorial expenses would increase \$1,200 even though we would require Sunrise to do its own daily cleaning and that we would need to hire a building manager at \$100 a month. At present we have neither a building manager nor a janitor. Members and friends interested in these jobs or with knowledge of people who might want to manage or clean the building are urged to contact a Board member.

If all goes well, Sunrise School will move its pre-school into Prairie in mid to late June. If conditional use permits are not granted or details of the lease (including financial arrangements) cannot be worked out, the Sunrise School will probably have to close its own doors, leaving at least 30 children's parents to find other daycare.

A Prairie informational meeting is planned for Sunday, March 12, after the morning service. Anyone with an interest in learning about the proposed rental or who wishes to express concerns about the proposal should attend. The Board has spent at least eight hours discussing this proposal and individual members have spent many additional hours researching the probable impact of having this daycare at Prairie. The Board would like to share this information with the membership at large and learn what additional concerns there may be that have not already been considered. A representative from the Sunrise School will also attend.

Fundraising Bus Trips Scheduled

Field Museum

This event is a General Fund fundraiser. The bus will leave Madison at 8:00 AM on April 8th from the Burlington Coat Factory parking lot. There will be a lunch stop at 11:15 at *Water Tower Place*, with two hours free time for shopping or what have you. The next stop will be the Field Museum, which has recently installed a new permanent exhibit which is a re-creation of an Egyptian Pharaoh's son's tomb and its contents. Wall reliefs and hieroglyphs have been recreated throughout the tomb and about 1400 art objects and artifacts are displayed. We'll leave Chicago at 4:30 PM, make a brief snack stop, and arrive back in Madison at 7:45 PM. The price of \$30.00 includes transportation and entrance to the museum.

Theater Trip

If you enjoy good theater, plan to join the "Prairie Playreaders" on Saturday, April 29th, for a Theater Bus Trip to the Milwaukee Repertory Theater production of **Juno and the Paycock**, Sean O'Casey's masterful representation of the heartache and pain engendered by the fervent patriotism of early 20th century Ireland. It is a story set in the past; but, still, apropos of this "modern" age. We will leave Madison at 2:30 PM and return at approximately 11:00 PM. The price of \$16 includes bus fare and theater ticket only. After the show, we will stop at Fuddrucker's (next to the Brookfield Mall), a restaurant known for its steaks, burgers, and salad bar, for dinner. Dinner will be on your own — a group as large as we hope to have (there will be room in the bus for 40) just cannot be seated together and served in any reasonable amount of time, and we haven't the resources to arrange a catered meal.

R. E. CORNER

With the warm weather almost upon us, the R. E. Committee has looked ahead to when our children will probably play outside while we parents socialize after the service. To assure their safety, the R. E. Committee would like to recruit an adult volunteer each Sunday to be outside with them. This adult (parent or non-parent) will supervise the play, basically making sure that where the children are and what they're doing is safe for both themselves and Prairie's grounds. So, once spring weather is actually with us, please be prepared to volunteer twenty minutes or so of your time after the morning service.

Until then, parents are reminded that at 11:15, when both the adult and R. E. programs conclude (theoretically, at least), they are responsible for their children. This means that when the children come upstairs and rejoin the

adults at 11:15, it is up to the parents as to whether the child will remain upstairs or go back downstairs to play until the family is ready to leave.

If the children do go back downstairs, please be aware that there are no adults scheduled to supervise their activity. This means that parents should check on their children periodically if they're going to be upstairs for any extended period. The R. E. Committee also invites any adult who happens to be downstairs and observes inappropriate behavior (roughhousing, abuse of materials, etc.) to intervene and explain what behavior would be acceptable.

We hope that Prairie adults will be willing to share responsibility for the children of Prairie in these ways.

Share With Our Neighbors

Now that Prairie is again open for business, we can again accept food donations for our needy neighbors. There are two families in our immediate neighborhood that need our help to be properly nourished. Please bring your donations on any Sunday and place them in the small room outside the Men's room. During the week, you can drop off donations at Mary Mullin's/Fredricka Schilling's home (call first). Perishable items can be donated as well as staples. Fredricka will see to it that perishables are delivered promptly. (Money is also an acceptable gift.)

Recycling

Prairie now has an account at Recycle Worlds, 2701 Packers Ave, 244-5451. You may take your recyclable items there. Before you get your recyclables weighed, tell them to put the money in the "Prairie Society" account. They will give you a receipt so you can claim your donation to Prairie on your taxes. Recycle Worlds accepts aluminum cans, corrugated cardboard, glass, newspapers, plastic bottles, and tin cans. They are open M-F 9-5:30; Saturday 8-4 and Sunday 11-4.

You can also bring your recyclables to Prairie. The collection containers for glass and aluminum have a temporary home in the downstairs entry-way. When the Prairie Board assesses space and use needs, the containers will be moved to a permanent location. Each Sunday, I will take newspaper and plastic containers (sorry, no plastic bags) but I don't plan to have collection bins for these at this point. Please do not obstruct the downstairs entryway. If you have more than will fit in the containers, or items other than glass and aluminum, please contact either me or Ken to make a direct transfer from your car to ours after the service.
