Prairie Canoe/ Camping Trip...

The 1989 Memorial Day weekend canoe/camping trip will begin on Friday, May 26th and end on Monday, May 29th. This year we will be camping at Camp Crazy Horse, west of Brodhead, and canoe Saturday and Sunday on the Sugar River.

To reach Camp Crazy Horse, travel south from Madison on route 14 to Brooklyn, then west on route 92 to county 'T'. Travel south on 'T' and route 104 to Brodhead, then west on route 11 and county 'F'. Just west of the Sugar River on 'F' look for Camp Crazy Horse on your left (south). We have camp sites directly on the Sugar River. Pets are permitted on a leash only. The fee for camping will be determined by the number of campers.

Please join us for all or part of the weekend. We will have potluck dinners on Friday, Saturday and Sunday nights.

<u>Friday</u>: Arrive any time. Check in at the campground office, tell them you are with Prairie Society. Please bring a dish to pass for the evening potluck dinner.

Saturday: We will put in at Minnehaha campground about 2 1/2 miles south of Albany on the Sugar River. This will make for a 3-4 hour trip at a steady 2 mph pace (this is shorter than the trip 2 years ago). We will not be able to leave any cars at Minnehaha, so you can either 1) drop your canoe off there, drive back to the camp ground, leave your car and get a ride at 10 AM with Stacy Baumgartner (owner of Camp Crazy Horse) to Minnehaha, or 2) pay \$2.00 to have Stacy transport you and your canoe to Minnehaha. On the river after the Decatur Dam, it is suggested we take the dam raceway (east branch). Camp Crazy Horse is located after the raceway rejoins the Sugar River. Please bring a dish to pass for the evening potluck dinner.

Sunday: At 10 AM, before canoeing, we will leave cars downstream where county 'T' crosses the Sugar River (about 7 miles or 3-4 hours) or possibly at the Avon landing (1 1/2 miles more). We will start canoeing at 11 AM. Please bring a dish to pass for the evening potluck dinner.

Dear Prairie Family-


We want to thank you all for your help and support when we were in Madison to hold a memorial service for our son, John, on Sunday, April 9th. I meant so much to us to be able to celebrate his life at our — and his — Prairie "home". So many of you gave us the reassurance we needed that John has not been forgotten, that his life, though short, counted for something to many people. that he was, and is, real. Also, you have helped us to understand that his death is real, something very difficult for us since he died so far away. Until we had been in Madison, we were sort of "on hold"; now we can begin to work through our grief.

There is no way we can sufficiently thank all those who helped us with the logistics of the service. We realize that it was an especially busy day on Prairie's schedule. We much appreciate that you bent to our tight schedule and helped us hold the service when we were able to.

It was hard coming home, where John had been born and grew up. It has been even harder, these past few weeks, being where nobody ever knew John and most people scarcely know us. We look forward to coming home again, in June, this time for keeps.
