




Program Chain for Upham Woods Retreat-Pat Stevenson

The annual Upham Woods Retreat allows our Prairie family to spend a weekend together without the distractions of our everyday lives. The scenic location on the Upper Wisconsin River is an ideal spot for enjoying fall from the vantage point of a canoe or a walk on the wooded island. The program offers choices from among active and quiet activities suited for all ages.

Throughout much of Friday evening we share a potluck as people arrive. Saturday morning activities usually include a nature walk on the island, a visit to the Upham Woods nature center, craft activities and a couple of discussion groups. Saturday afternoon activities usually include volleyball, New Games, an island hike, and additional discussions. 

Directions to Upham Woods

From the NORTH on I-90/94: Use exit 85. Turn east onto 12/16 headed south. Turn right onto 60th St and right again onto County N. Upham Woods is on the left .8 mile.

From the SOUTH on I-90/94:
Use exit 87. Turn left at the second stoplight onto 12/16 Exit 87 north. At hilltop turn right MHY 13 NORTH ONTO COUNTY A. County A WISCONSIN DELLS becomes N beyond RR underpass.
Upham Woods is on the right .6 mile.

From the EAST on WI-16 or 23: Follow 16/23 through the city of Wisconsin Dells. Cross the Wisconsin River. Turn right onto 12/16 north. At hilltop turn right onto county A. County A becomes N beyond RR underpass. Upham Woods is on the right .6 mile.

From Baraboo on US-12:
Follow US-12 through Lake
Delton to the "Crossroads"
intersection with WI-16/23.
Continue straight through the
intersection. At hilltop turn
right onto county A. County A
becomes N beyond RR underpass.
Upham Woods is on the right .6
mile.

Note to TRUCKS:

The RR underpass on county A has a clearance of 12'2''.

Taller trucks should continue north on 12/16 and turn right (east) onto 60th street. Turn right onto county N. Upham Woods is on the left .8 mile.
