
When we receive notice of the CMD activities we will include them in the Prairie Fire and have registration material available at the greeting table or the literature rack.





# Growing Times (Pre-school & Nursery)

This group got the treat of finger painting with puddings, an experience satisfying to lots of the senses. They also have been playing with puzzles and hearing stories read to them.
