



Why The Pygmy Dance

Prairie Patter

My special treat for myself is to have a daily subscription to the New York Times. I chose to do this and stop subscribing to weekly news magazines. Many times I find articles I want to share with others. I learn so much from discussing with friends and colleagues ideas and issues that are stimulated by what I'm reading. The following is a previously unpublished letter by C. G. Jung in response to Ruth Topping, a prominent Chicago social worker. She had asked him to explain a comment of his in a Chicago newspaper and to define "religious outlook."

Zurich Nov. 12, 1959

When you study the mental history of the world, you see that people since times immemorial had a general teaching or doctrine about the wholeness of the world. Originally and down to our days, they were considered to be holy traditions taught to the young people as a preparation for their future life. This has been the case in primitive tribes as well as in highly differentiated civilizations. The teaching had always a "philosophical" and "ethical" aspect.

In our civilization this spiritual background has gone astray. Our Christian doctrine has lost its grip to an appalling extent, chiefly because people don't understand it any more. Thus one of the most important instinctual activities of our mind has lost its object.

As these views deal with the world as a whole, they create also a wholeness of the individual, so much so, that for instance a primitive tribe loses its vitality, when it is deprived of its specific religious outlook. People are no more rooted in their world and lose their orientation. They just drift. That is very much our condition, too. The need for a meaning of their lives remains unanswered, because the rational, biological goals are unable to express the irrational wholeness of human life. Thus life loses its meaning. That is the problem of the "religious outlook" in a nutshell.

The problem itself cannot be settled by a few slogans. It demands concentrated attention, much mental work and, above all, patience, the rarest thing in our restless and crazy time.

I was nineteen when this letter was written. The times seem even more restless and crazy now at fifty-three. I appreciate Prairie and Unitarian Universalism as a place to experience the wholeness of the world, to be rooted and to find meaning in my life.

A Gift Without Price



Policy statement regarding building Use and Fee schedule

We of Prairie Unitarian-Universalist Society reaffirm our belief in freedom of religious, social and political expression; it is our desire that our Meeting House be dedicated to the furtherance of these goals.

The following policies and fees are therefore adopted for the purpose of facilitating, scheduling, and supporting the cost of building use for other than Prairie U-U Activities:

1. No charge shall be made for Prairie U-U activities and Prairie members' activities.
2. The following rates shall apply for Prairie members who wish to use the building for groups with which they are affiliated (and who plan to be present and responsible):

Upstairs only:*	\$15.00
Downstairs only:*	5.00
Kitchen	5.00
Other:	Negotiable

3. The following rates shall apply for other groups and individuals:

Upstairs only:*	25.00
Downstairs only:*	10.00
Kitchen	15.00
Other	Negotiable

4. REGULAR OR RECURRENT USE: Rates and terms for use are subject to negotiation, and determination by the Board of Directors of Prairie.
5. USE OF BUILDING FOR FUND RAISING: Community, educational, religious and charitable non-profit organizations are the ONLY groups which may use the House for fund raising, whether by admission charge, auction, or other activity. unless authorized by the Board of Directors of Prairie.
6. The rates quoted above are for a period of up to 4 hours. Longer periods are to be negotiated.
7. A calendar and schedule for use of the building is kept by Julie Bonser. Please contact a least two (2) weeks in advance.

*Use of coffee maker and cups permitted.

FEES ARE BASED ON THE UNDERSTANDING THAT THE BUILDING WILL BE LEFT IN THE SAME CONDITION IT WAS WHEN USE BEGAN.
