Don't make Judy panic and run to the grocery store because your donation is not there when she arrives at 7:30 AM on Sunday morning.

Prairie Patter

Last week the members of Prairie UU Society voted to pass the proposed budget and to instruct the Board to decide which items to cut as our anticipated pledge income was insufficient to meet our needs. We were also instructed to contact members and friends of Prairie to request they pledge some money to Prairie or to increase their pledge. They also asked for more information about expectations. I did some research about UU's giving patterns. The pledges in other societies for 1992/93 averaged \$954 per pledging unit. Generally speaking people donate about 2 to 2 1/2 percent of their gross income to churches and charity. That would mean a family with income of \$40,000 would donate \$1000 a year to church and charities.

Our pledges range from \$15 a year to \$2640 a year for 1995. Last year we had 65 pledging unit for a total of 29,089. As of today we have 38 pledging units with an average of \$372 per unit. The median pledge is \$300 which means half of our pledges are

less than \$301 a year. Another way to look at our range of giving is two pledges are over \$2000, 6 pledges between \$1000 and \$2000, 4 between \$500 and \$1000, and 25 pledges under \$500.

The strengths of Prairie cannot be measured by the amount of money pledged to keep us going. However it can be a measure of weakness. This is an area where we are not up to standard. All the indications are we have enough members and friends to support a budget twice the amount of our current proposal. We choose to volunteer our labor more than our income because we want to be a lay led society that emphasizes our ministry to each other. We also need your fiscal support to help us minister to each other in a more organized way so that we don't overlook the needs of anyone within our congregation.

You will notice that choir practice does not appear on the calendar until December 11th. That's because the choir worked so hard and gave such an outstnading performance at the Bach program, that they earned a two week vacation! On December 11th, the choir will begin rehearsal of the "Advent Meditation" for Christmas. Anyone who wants to sing is welcome to join the choir, and the next rehearsal would be the ideal time since they are starting to learn new music.

Prairie Finances (not good!)

-or, How Can I Help? On Sunday, November 13, we adopted a budget of \$42,119 for 1995. So far, we have about \$20,300 in pledges, of the \$34,824 we need to make the budget. We voted to give the Board discretion for what to retain and what to cut. Even if we eliminate the "administrative" position, we will not be even close to meeting our needs. Each MEMBER (NOT pledging unit, or family) costs Prairie \$63 a year (or \$5.25 a month) in dues and Prairie Fires. In order to meet our budgeted pledges, each MEMBER would have to pledge \$314 a year or \$26 a month. Every single one of us must think carefully about how important Prairie is to our lives. PLEASE reconsider how much ;you can afford to give to Prairie next year. If each of our 111 members increased their monthly pledge by only \$5.00, it would make an additional \$66600 aviailable to Prairie.

And, while on the delicate matter of contributions, your Finance Committee urges you to pay the remainder of your 1994 pledges before the end of the year. Prairie CANNOT afford to begin the new year with a deficit.

In Our Hands, grades 6, 7, 8

Last week Randy Converse led this group in exploring the life and actions of Susan B. Anthony and Henry D. Thoreau, and especially how their actions are tied to UU principles. To do this the group first played "Whip" where they went around in a circle with each person saying in one sentence what they would change in their school and

then what they would change in the world. Then they read the plays, *The Night Thoreau Spent in Jail* and *Susan B. Anthony*. The readings were followed by discussions of how the actions of these two UUs were based on UU principles; of decisions to break laws and accepting the consequences of law breaking; of working to change laws; and of how to change things without hurting others.

Timeless Themes, grades 3, 4, 5

Welcome to Bob Purvis who has joined the teaching team for this group!! Bob led this session on the Old Testament story of Joseph and his brothers. After reading and listening to the story, the kids drew designs for coats for Joseph and talked about relationships with brother and sisters, and how they deal with anger and jealousy.

Caring Hands, grades K, 1, 2

This was the Converse week to lead RE sessions, with Randy with the oldest group and Kathy leading this younger one. The theme here was caring and uncaring which they explored by trying to understand what the word caring really means. Some meanings they derived were helping, nice acts, sharing feelings. They played three cooperative games to explore the theme: tossing a yarn ball across a circle to make a great spider web that connected everyone and needed everyone's care to keep it intact; "Silly Bones," where each person chose two body parts to connect the circle, such as ear to knee or foot to elbow (gentle care was needed to keep this game fun); and animal drawings, where each person drew just one part of an animal before passing it to the next person to draw the next. The resulting whale/penguin and bunny/ person were delightful and fun. They each also made a gift certificate for an act of caring to give to someone they care about.

Preschool/Nursery

Attendance for this age group has been low for the past few weeks, with only one child present again last week. But she (Toby Wacker) is very happy about that and says she likes being the only one there. Nora Bosch spent time with Toby last Sunday.
