Obituary

Longtime Prairie member, Odell "Tally" Taliaferro died April 12, 1999 at St. Mary's Long Term Health Care Facility. Tall was fortunate to have his former neighbor, Sue Hubbard, as a volunteer health care advocate for the time he was at St. Mary's Health Care Facility. Here are excerpts from the letter she wrote neighbors.

This morning Odell Taliaferro died. He was 92 years of age and continued to enjoy life until this past Thursday. He was found in the morning unresponsive and examination revealed several serious and life threatening scenarios. Tali (as we all called him) made a decision for him-self when given the options for treatment. He chose no tests, no exams, and no more hospitals. He refused anti-biotics for possible infection. He accepted treatment to make him comfortable only. He was told that he might live two to three days if the treatment team honored his decision. He said that was fine. He was tired. He only worried about the pain his

daughter, Joan, might feel. We called Joan on the phone and he told her of his decision.

We kept him as comfortable as we could, the staff were wonderful at St. Mary's. He was given pain medication, muscle relaxants to decrease the frequency and severity of spasms, medications to decrease congestion in his chest, oxygen to breath, and finally, lots of TLC. He was ready to die, and we believe that he chose his time.

According to Tali's wishes, there will be no funeral. His family is planning a memorial service at the Unitarian Church sometime during the week of May 9th. If you wish to send a card to his daughter, Joan, her address is:

Hazel continues to reside at St. Mary's Health Center and although she is generally in stable health, she does not demonstrate recognition of familiar persons. Tali spent time with her daily and he did not think that she recognized him. She has not been told and the family would appreciate this being honored by anyone visiting. It is difficult to determine if she is able to process this cognitively and emotionally.

I know that Tali would thank you for being part of his life.

Bread and the Spirit by Lynn Olcott published in the Sept./Oct, 1997 issue of World

Blending the moist ingredients with the dry, I stir deeply, enjoying the strength of the wooden spoon. Something is trying to be said in my soul. If I keep stirring, I will learn what it is.

Turning the dough out on the counter, I knead it and hum a childhood hymn, and my heart awakens to the Spirit always in me. Kneading the dough can be like dancing. On my toes in an old ballet step, I lean my palms into the floury mass.

There it is, in the words to the barely remembered hymn I am humming. Years of Christian words are pressing lessons on me about Him, He, His - the message of female unworthiness in a Christian world.

Breathing deeply, I roll and turn the warm dough into a ball and then nestle it carefully into a bowl.

In an hour the dough has doubled in size. I press it small again and let it rest. I think of all the translating I've learned to do in church after church, distilling the Spirit's love from a theology that never absolves us of the original sin of being born female.

Shaped into loaves now, the dough rises again. I'm good at translating. God is really a Mother playing with her babies in a pie-fragrant house. It makes more sense than a God who controls the outcome of football games.

I place the bread pans in the searing oven. Grandma Moses used the same six bread pans from the time she married at 17 until her death, many loaves and great-grandchildren later. She took great joy in her faith. Did she mind the He pronouns? The spirit is greater than gender. The Spirit is greater than theology. The Spirit is a universe of love, and all life is prayer. I offer this bread to my family from the Spirit. I offer the Spirit to my family in the bread. The Spirit is an Equal Opportunity Employer. The message from the Spirit is clear.
